**Ref.: AMENDMENT TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2009-10
ENVIRONMENTAL ENHANCEMENT AND MITIGATION (EEM) PROGRAM
RESOLUTION G-10-11 amending RESOLUTION G-10-07**

ISSUE

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2009-10 State Budget provided \$10 million for the Environmental Enhancement and Mitigation (EEM) Program. Should the Commission program the balance of \$124,830 to the next project listed on the EEM Program Substitution List?

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Commission adopt the attached resolution to program the available balance of \$124,830 to the next project listed on the EEM Program Substitution List.

The Resources Agency evaluated 68 eligible applications and developed a Recommended for Funding List (32 projects) and a Substitution List (36 projects). The draft lists were presented for notice at the February 24-25, 2010 Commission meeting.

At its April 7-8, 2010 meeting, the Commission approved a program of 32 EEM projects for \$9,875,170, leaving \$124,830 unprogrammed and available for future uses.

The 32 projects on the final Projects Recommended for Funding List were the top-ranked projects, and included a Substitution List project in Culver City (Ballona Creek Bikeway) to replace a project withdrawn (Emerald Necklace Greening) by Amigos De Los Rios, an agency in Los Angeles County. The adopted program, Resolution G-10-07, included 15 projects in the north for \$4,558,258, and the 17 projects in the south for \$5,316,912, for a FY 2009-10 EEM Program total of \$9,875,170.

The remaining 35 projects on the final Substitution List are shown by location, in priority order by category, for substitution should any project on the Recommended for Funding list be unable to proceed. It includes 14 projects in the northern counties projects and 21 projects in the southern counties.

The Resources Agency contacted The Nature Conservancy, the agency with the top-ranked project on the Substitution List (Proctor Valley Habitat Protection), to find out if the \$124,830 balance would allow The Nature Conservancy to proceed with the project. The total project cost is \$886,029, of which \$350,000 was to be funded by EEM. The agency has accepted the balance amount of \$124,830 and has found additional local funds to make up the difference. The total project cost remains \$886,029, the \$124,830 EEM funds plus \$761,199 from other sources.

The Commission has the statutory responsibility to fund an annual EEM Program as prioritized by the State Resources Agency in accordance with the funding level provided in the State Budget Act.

BACKGROUND

Under the EEM statutes, Streets and Highways Code Section 164.56(e), the Resources Agency is responsible for developing and adopting procedures and criteria; evaluating grant proposals; submitting a list of ranked projects recommended for funding; and finding that the projects are eligible for funding under Article XIX of the State Constitution. The Resources Agency's procedures and criteria contain a detailed, quantitative scoring mechanism that is used to evaluate and rank projects in priority order by assigning point scores to each project. In accordance with the provisions of Section 187 and 188 of the Streets and Highway Code, an attempt is made to allocate 40% of the total amount recommended to projects in the northern counties and 60% of the total amount to projects in southern counties.

The EEM Program is designed to undertake environmental enhancement and mitigation projects that are directly or indirectly related to the environmental impact of modifying existing transportation facilities or constructing new transportation facilities. EEM projects must provide environmental enhancements and mitigation over and above what is otherwise called for under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) of 1970 or the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969.

The general categories of EEM projects eligible for funding are:

- Highway Landscape and Urban Forestry projects designed to offset vehicular emissions of carbon dioxide through the planting of trees and other suitable plants. Projects may be within or outside the right-of-way of the related transportation facility. Projects within the right-of-way are not intended to supplant or augment highway landscaping that would normally be funded by the responsible public agency. Any planting within public road rights-of-way shall be limited to trees only.
- Resource Lands acquisition, restoration or enhancement to mitigate the loss or damage to resource lands within or near the right-of-way acquired for transportation improvements. Resource lands include natural areas, wetlands, forests, woodlands, meadows, streams, or other areas containing fish or wildlife habitat. Enhancement of resource lands may include the restoration of wildlife corridors.
- Roadside Recreational acquisition and/or development of roadside recreational opportunities, including roadside rests, scenic overlooks, trails, trailheads, sno-parks, and parks.

Any local, state or federal agency or nonprofit entity may apply for and receive grants under the EEM Program. The applicant is not required to be a transportation organization but must be able to demonstrate adequate charter or enabling authority to carry out the type of project proposed.

Resolution G-10-11, amending Resolution G-10-07

- 1.1 WHEREAS, Streets and Highways Code Section 164.56 establishes the Environmental Enhancement and Mitigation Program; and
- 1.2 WHEREAS, this program provides \$10 million annually for environmental enhancement and mitigation projects which are directly or indirectly related to the environmental impact of modifying existing transportation facilities or for the design, construction or expansion of new transportation facilities; and
- 1.3 WHEREAS, the Resources Agency is charged with evaluating proposals submitted for this program and providing a list of proposals recommended for funding to the Commission; and
- 1.4 WHEREAS, the Commission is responsible for awarding grants to fund proposals which are included on the list prepared by the Resources Agency; and
- 1.5 WHEREAS, the Resources Agency prepared a Projects Recommended for Funding list, and the draft list was noticed at the Commission's February 24-25, 2010 meeting, and
- 1.6 WHEREAS, on April 7, 2010, the Commission adopted Resolution G-10-07, approving the final Projects Recommended for Funding list totaling \$9,875,170 for thirty-two projects; and
- 1.7 WHEREAS, in April 2010, the Resources Agency submitted a request to add The Nature Conservancy's Proctor Valley Habitat Protection project (from the Substitution List) and to program the remaining \$124,830 to the project; and
- 1.8 WHEREAS, the Resources Agency has submitted an amended Projects Recommended for Funding list, including the addition of the remaining \$124,830 to the Proctor Valley Habitat Protection project; and
- 1.9 WHEREAS, the amended list, including all supplemental information, has been reviewed by Commission staff, and appears to meet all basic requirements as specified in the EEM statutes, and the Commission policies and guidelines.

- 2.1 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Commission adopts the amended list for the FY 2009-10 Environmental Enhancement and Mitigation Program totaling \$10,000,000 for thirty-three projects, as indicated in the attached revised list of projects.
- 2.2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the intent of the Commission to allocate all \$10 million available in Fiscal Year 2009-10 funds for these projects, and expects that funds so allocated should be expended on a timely basis, preferably by June 30, 2011; and
- 2.3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that for projects which include land acquisition, the Commission would encourage grant recipients to reduce overall project costs by exploring the feasibility of acquiring easements rather than fee title when appropriate; and
- 2.4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that due to the uniqueness of the individual projects in this program, the Commission hereby directs the Department of Transportation to be especially diligent in the on-site inspection and auditing of the projects included in this program; and
- 2.5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Resolution G-10-07 is hereby amended.
