The California Poppy (Eschscholzia californica) is the perfect state flower for California. When it blooms, it is often called, "A cup of gold," an appropriate comparison to gold that was discovered in our state in 1848. While California poppies can be found throughout our state, they can be grown in many other places in the world too! In the spring, it's not unusual to see poppies alongside the state's highways.



California Quail

The California quail (*Callipepla californica*), also known as the California valley quail or simply Valley quail, is the state bird of California. It's a small bird that spends most of its time on the ground in a family called a covey. California quails do not migrate so when you see a covey of quails once, expect to see it again! Keep an eye out for quail coveys as you travel Highway 49 through Gold Rush towns like Coloma, where James Marshall first discovered gold on January 24, 1848.



California Redwood

The California redwood (Sequoia sempervirens) is the state tree of California. Once common throughout the Northern Hemisphere, today they are only found along the Pacific Coast of the United States. Many of these trees are preserved in state and national parks and forests. Coast redwoods are the tallest trees in the world! Several of California's highways travel through impressive stands of these magnificent tress, particularly Highway 101 along California's northern coast.

Sort your trash. Recycling reduces the trash going into landfills, extending the life of the landfills.



Secure loads in trucks and trailers to prevent litter on the roadway. Be mindful of trash blowing out of your car on a windy day.

A clean yard prevents things from blowing into streets, rivers, and open spaces.



Hold on to the small things. Birds, fish, and other animals mistake micro-trash, like candy wrappers, for food and nesting materials.



Try not to use single-use items, like disposable shopping bags, plastic eating utensils, and styrofoam. Many of these things never biodegrade.



Recycle bulky items, like appliances, at your local landfill or transfer station.
