- The wildlife crossing components will be delivered concurrently with the Dos Pueblos to Gaviota Capital Maintenance Project (CAPM)
- The project has a highly accelerated schedule to meet Federal grant milestones

From postmile 30.1 to 46.4:


- Preserve 65.3 lane miles of flexible class 1 pavement
- Reconstruct guardrail to standards
- Lighting rehabilitation
- Replace sign panels


From postmile 46.4 to R48.8

- Construct wildlife undercrossing near PM 46.4
- Install wildlife fencing and escape ramps on both side of the highway

Wildlife Crossings Pilot Program (WCPP) Update

- Since October, the project has been moving through environmental technical studies
- Our project development team has continued to meet
 - FHWA recommendations
 - · Focus on the target species for the crossing
- A bridge is the selected structure type for the crossing, which will enable passage for mountain lions, deer, and smaller fauna
