Executive Summary

Streets and Highways Code, Section 158.1 (c), requires the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) to develop a list of funded transportation projects with wildlife features that address wildlife connectivity needs and publish to its website biennially. The department shall update the inventory and the project list biennially, at a minimum, and may update the inventory or the list more often, as needed. The first inventory was published in July of 2024. This report constitutes the second published inventory (July 2026), and the inventory will be updated for the biennial legislative report in July of 2028.

Background

In 2022 Assembly Bill 2344 was passed and is codified in Streets and Highways Code (SHC), which requires Caltrans to assess, prioritize, and remediate priority barriers to wildlife on the State Highway System (SHS).

In July 2023 Caltrans created the Office of Fish and Wildlife Connectivity (FWC), which is focused on statewide connectivity, to include permeability assessment oversight, program management, and to support partnering and project delivery. The Office of FWC reports to Caltrans headquarters Division of Environmental Analysis (DEA) to support and guide Caltrans districts in the implementation and reporting for Streets and Highways Code Section 156 (fish passage), Section 158 (wildlife movement), and to manage the FWC inventory as part of the State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP). The FWC SHOPP program was created in 2020, with a focus on fish passage priority barrier remediation and was expanded in 2022 to include priority wildlife connectivity barriers.

Caltrans, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), and other state, federal and local partners have been collaborating on wildlife connectivity efforts for many years. Table 1: Ongoing Wildlife Connectivity Partnerships (page 8) lists the partnerships that have been identified by districts to date. As additional wildlife connectivity partnerships or additional partner members are identified the table will be updated.

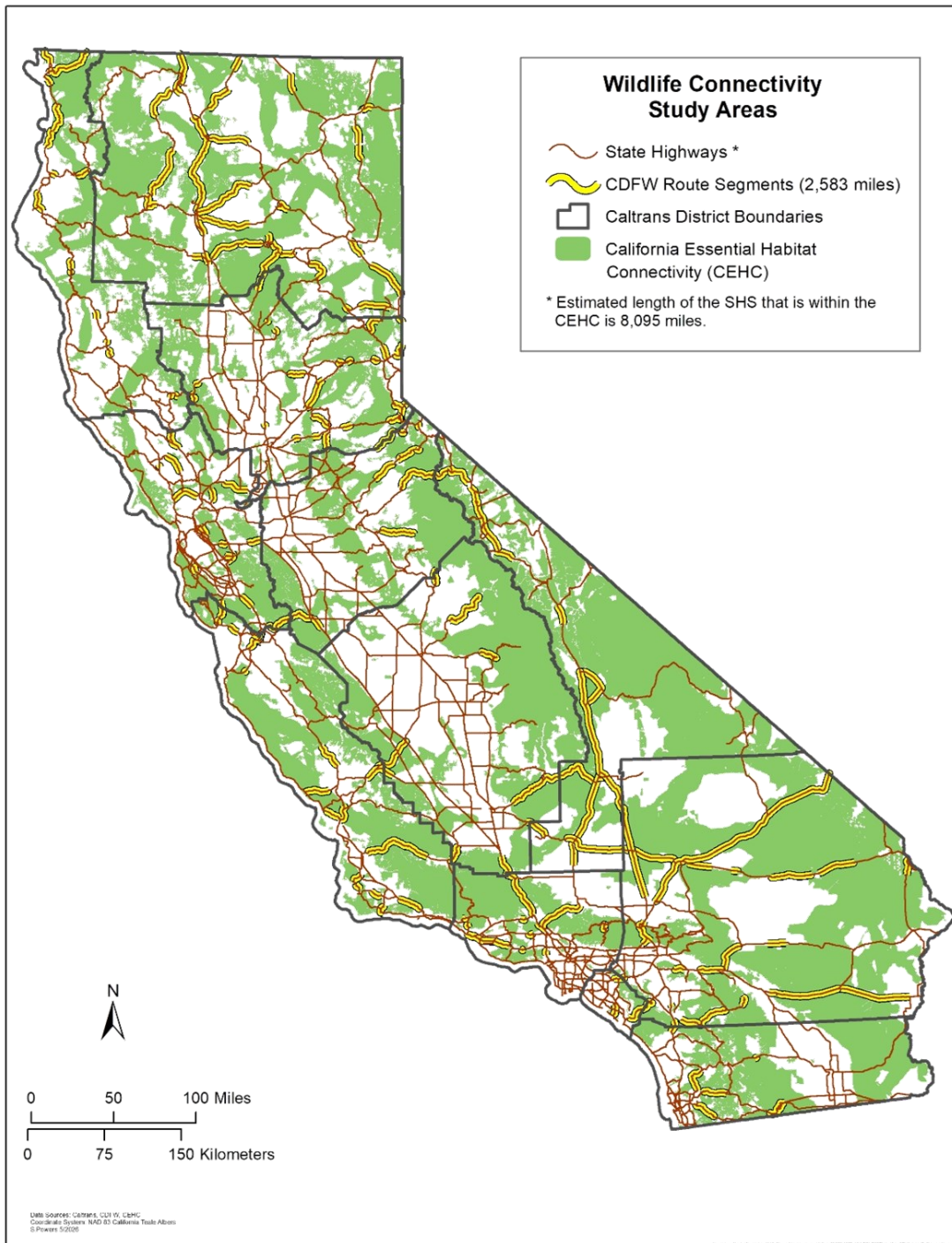


Figure 1. Wildlife Connectivity Study Area

In February of 2010, the 'California Essential Habitat Connectivity Project: A Strategy for Conserving a Connected California' (CEHC), was published by Caltrans and CDFW, and was funded by Caltrans and the Federal Highways Administration (FHWA). Other contributing partners included the California Department of Parks and Recreation (CDPR), California Department of Water Resources (DWR), the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and other state, federal, and local technical advisory experts. Many of Caltrans current active (funded), planned funded, and other priority wildlife connectivity projects have been informed by this multi-year collaboration and extensive final report. The CEHC identified 850 large, relatively unfragmented blocks of natural land that support native biodiversity, which align with **8,095** miles of SHS (see Figure 1, below). To date, the CEHC represents the most collaborative statewide strategy for wildlife connectivity remediation.

CDFW has also published a wildlife connectivity report, the most recent iteration is 'Restoring California's Wildlife Connectivity 2022'. The 2022 report lists linear infrastructure route segments on the SHS, railroads, canals, high-speed rail, and local roads, and lists SHS route segments that CDFW has identified as priority wildlife barrier projects. CDFW has continued to add priority route

segments to their webpage, as recently as 2025, significantly increasing the number of routes and lane miles. The CDFW 2022 report listed **141** state highway route segments equating to **1,707** miles, and segments that CDFW has added through 2025 have increased the total state highway segments to **172**, which equate to **2,583** lane miles. Further, some route segments identified in the 2022 CDFW report have been reduced or extended. CDFW continues to share science and data with Caltrans and other interested partners to substantiate the **172** SHS route segments currently identified as a priority for wildlife connectivity needs.

This report summarizes the identification and evaluation of reported data for Caltrans and sponsor led (special funded) wildlife connectivity project and pre-project efforts on the SHS. All locations were identified by Caltrans districts, who for many years have conducted varying levels of coordination with CDFW, USFWS, and other state, federal, local partners, and tribal nations (see Table 1: Ongoing Wildlife Connectivity Partnerships, on page 8).

Since the last published Caltrans wildlife connectivity inventory in 2024, **4** active (funded) wildlife connectivity barriers have been remediated (completed), which provide access to an estimated **9.3** stream miles for salmon and steelhead and **102,805** watershed acres for other aquatic and terrestrial species. Of the **4** completed locations **3** were fish passage priorities that co-benefit wildlife connectivity barrier remediation within natural landscape movement features, **1** location is within an area identified in the CEHC, **1** location is within a CDFW priority route segment, and **3** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by CA State Parks or the U.S. Forest Service (USFS).

Based on the evaluation of available science, data, and other information provided to date, Caltrans and partners are currently developing **39** active (funded) wildlife connectivity remediation locations. Of the **39** active (funded) wildlife connectivity locations, **21** locations are within areas identified in the CEHC, **18** locations are within CDFW priority route segments, and **33** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDFW, CDPR, and others.

Districts and partners are developing planning documents and feasibility studies for wildlife connectivity locations that are in the pre-project phase. Caltrans Capital projects will complete Project Initiation Documents (PID) to identify potential project alternatives, provide a record of purpose-and-need, and estimate the scope, cost, and schedule. Capital locations will need to be allocated by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) before they are considered active (funded) projects. There are **31** wildlife connectivity barrier locations currently in the planning stage. Of the **31** planned funding locations, **20** are within areas identified in the CEHC, **19** locations are within CDFW priority route segments, and **31** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDPR, U.S. National Park Service (USNPS), and others.

Caltrans districts are currently collaborating with **89** identified state, federal, and local partners, including CDFW. Partners support districts in the identification of fragmented wildlife habitat and movement corridors to consider departmental aligned remediation opportunities and aligned priorities. Science and data that is evaluated to consider priority aligned transportation locations includes studies and other related reports, species diversity and habitat suitability, tracking and camera data, stakeholder input, hotspot carcass data, landscape and land use, or related professional knowledge.

Currently there are **93** priority wildlife connectivity barrier locations identified which require funding. Of the **93** priority wildlife barrier locations, **52** are within areas identified by the CEHC, **74** locations are within CDFW priority route segments, and **93** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDPR, USNPS, and others.

This report represents the second inventory update in an ongoing effort to identify, prioritize, and remediate priority wildlife connectivity barrier locations on the SHS. All barrier locations

included in this inventory were identified by Caltrans districts and partners in consideration of current wildlife connectivity barrier remediation needs within respective district areas. Consultation with key stakeholders, including CDFW, and other state, federal and local partners have relied on the **37** ongoing district area partner collaborations which are listed in Table 1: Ongoing Wildlife Connectivity Partnerships (page 8).

Caltrans has implemented a reconnaissance Wildlife Connectivity Permeability assessment in partnership with the California Conservation Corps (3C's) which acts to collect SHS facility data, including photos and general landscape information. The study area covers approximately **10,678** miles of SHS routes which align with CEHC fragmented habitat areas and CDFW identified priority route segments (see Figure 1: Wildlife Connectivity Study Area, page 3). Districts continue to gain needed input from CDFW and other state, federal, and locals within the **37** ongoing wildlife connectivity partnerships.

In October of 2024 Caltrans held a virtual Wildlife Connectivity Workshop in collaboration with CDFW. The workshop was attended by **397** state, federal, and local partners. The Caltrans 2024 Wildlife Connectivity Program report was shared, along with other wildlife connectivity program information, in addition to answering attendee questions. In the fall of 2026 Caltrans will host a virtual Wildlife Connectivity Workshop update for partners and looks forward to continued progress toward the collaborative goal of improving wildlife movement in California.

Caltrans Fish and Wildlife Connectivity Program Overview

Caltrans continues to make progress on SHS fish and wildlife connectivity remediation by supporting the nationally awarded Fish Passage Advisory Committees (FishPAC), continued engagement in the **37** ongoing wildlife connectivity partnerships across the state, and by implementing Wildlife Passages Advisory Committees (WildPAC) partnerships. Like FishPAC, the WildPAC's will share science and data, nominate and prioritize barriers, evaluate aligned funding opportunities, support implementation of barrier remediation projects, and continue to monitor projects on the SHS to demonstrate successful implementation and lessons learned. Progress made by the Caltrans and 3C's permeability assessment teams is essential to identifying transportation aligned wildlife barriers that block movement within natural landscape features in alignment with CEHC fragmented habitat areas and CDFW priority route segments, so the WildPAC's can evaluate and nominate wildlife connectivity barrier remediation needs. This necessary preliminary inventory work will allow for strategic nomination of barriers for prioritization and successful barrier remediation.

As one of the largest states Caltrans manages approximately 15,181 miles of highway across California. Executing a large-scale, statewide initiative of this magnitude requires a methodical approach, a thorough investigation, and strategic planning to ensure complex considerations including evaluation of available data and collection of data that is lacking, safety, maintainability, transport trucking standards, seismicity requirements, as well as efficacy and service life of design considerations. The complexity of the statewide deployment of a program of this size demands a phased, data-driven approach to ensure actions are deliberate and well-coordinated. Proceeding without proper planning increases exposure to avoidable risks. The department is prioritizing smart, sustainable action over quick fixes.

Science and Data

Infrastructure, including roadways, railways, canals, walls, fencing, and other human made features act to bisect habitat that is essential to the life cycle of species, creating barriers for over **180** threatened or endangered species listed under the California Endangered Species Act (CESA) and/or the Federal Endangered Species Act (FESA), as well as other common species. Habitat loss through landscape fragmentation and development have led to isolated species populations, reduced genetic dispersal, and increased risk of mortality and extinction. Improving connectivity between and within fragmented habitats will enhance resilience for terrestrial and aquatic species to environmental risks including drought, wildfire, and other climate change stressors, and will further reduce animal/vehicle collisions.

Natural terrestrial and aquatic landscape movement corridors often coincide with existing, undersized culvert and bridge facilities including rivers, desert washes, and mountain draws. When the California highway system was originally constructed, excess material from higher elevation cut slope areas (e.g., hills and mountains) were used to create a level and compacted base for what is now the SHS roadway prism. The majority of what is now the California highway system was constructed prior to 1966, before enactment of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). In alignment with state and federal laws and policies of the time, natural movement corridors were confined by undersized conveyances and then “filled in” with excess cut material. These “legacy” barriers within natural landscape movement corridors block access to high quality habitat that is essential to the life cycle needs of aquatic and terrestrial species. These barriers on natural landscape movement features contribute to species dispersal resulting in increased animal/vehicle hotspots.

Within urban areas, on private lands, and in areas impacted by agriculture, stream corridors are often the only movement corridors for aquatic and terrestrial species that are protected from development and other impacts by state and federal jurisdictional requirements. Remediation of SHS fish and wildlife connectivity barriers will continue to enhance California's landscape and further reduce fragmentation of habitat caused by roadways, development, and other infrastructure which have contributed to the steady decline of threatened, endangered, special status, and other species across California.

Since 2020 Caltrans and the 3C's have collaborated to assess connectivity barriers on the SHS using software, field tablet devices, and geospatial technology for data collection, quality control, and information sharing. This technology efficiently conveys assignments to the 3C's assessment teams, empowering them to collect high-quality data and photographs while requiring a fraction of the time and labor of conventional data verification and input methods. Through the successful 3C's partnership and implementation of innovative technologies Caltrans has completed over 5,200 fish passage barrier assessments.

In 2024 Caltrans and the 3C's expanded the assessment partnership by recruiting several new 3C's centers and corps member teams and training them to conduct a reconnaissance 'Wildlife Connectivity Permeability Assessment', which includes collection of facility information, conveyance and landscape photos, and other land use information to further support Caltrans' evaluation of the SHS, (Figure 2, page 7). Wildlife barrier data and related photos will be shared with Wildlife Passage Advisory Committees in story maps so WildPAC members can review in

consideration of collaboratively nominating and prioritizing wildlife barriers. The scope of the current wildlife permeability assessment includes **10,678** miles of state highways within the CEHC and CDFW identified route segments.

Partnerships

Currently Caltrans is engaged in **37** partnerships which vary in membership and scope, ranging from smaller local areas to covering multiple county areas or districts. The 37 statewide partnerships that districts have reported to date are listed in, Table 1: Ongoing Wildlife Connectivity Partnerships (page 8), which currently includes **89** state, federal, and local partners. As additions are identified the list of partnerships will be updated for future reporting.

In the fall of 2026 Caltrans will start to develop WildPAC in collaboration with CDFW and other state, federal and local partners. Coordination between Caltrans and the WildPAC partnership is essential to achieving a fully vetted priority inventory and improving partnership support and input including science and data sharing, nominating and prioritizing barriers, identification of aligned funding opportunities, project delivery support, training opportunities, and post-project monitoring to verify successful implementation of barrier remediation projects and document lessons learned.

Engineering

Fish and wildlife connectivity remediation solutions require consideration of system performance including service life, constructability, seismicity, transport trucking, maintainability, safety, species efficacy (openness needs), and other SHS standards and legal requirements.

In 2015 Caltrans, CDFW, and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) created the Interagency Engineering Work Group (Work Group). The Work Group convenes monthly to collaborate on connectivity expertise related to modeling, training, design guidance, geotechnical investigations and geomorphology, research needs, project delivery support, and other information sharing. Member expertise includes hydraulic engineering, structures and foundations design, watershed modeling, maintenance, and design guidance for fish passage remediation and channel restoration. Caltrans engineers that work on fish and wildlife connectivity attend the Work Group and it is anticipated that membership will increase as additional fish and wildlife engineering experts are identified.

Funding

Caltrans develops fish and wildlife barrier priority inventories based on partner and district identification of aligned transportation needs to identify and plan for fish and wildlife barrier remediation needs. The transportation aligned inventory is a satellite asset in the State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP) and is evaluated as such in the State Highway System Management Plan (SHSMP), which is a performance driven and integrated plan for the SHS. The plan integrates rehabilitation, maintenance, and operations into a single 10-year management strategy, which is updated biennially. All deficiencies are managed and tracked to align with multiple program investments and resulting performance objectives.

Fish passage barrier remediation was introduced as a SHOPP satellite inventory in 2020, and wildlife connectivity was added as a satellite inventory in 2022. Fish and wildlife priority barrier inventories are evaluated for transportation funding alignment opportunities.

Permitting Efficiencies

Fish and wildlife connectivity remediation is an environmental enhancement and, in most cases, aligns with restoration permitting efficiencies. The goal of permitting efficiencies is to streamline the process to improve the rate of recovery and conservation of species and their habitats. For Caltrans projects this means time and cost savings to more efficiently implement fish and wildlife connectivity projects across California.

For many years Caltrans has engaged with state and federal permitting partners to implement streamlined programmatic permitting for full span fish passage and multi-species barrier remediation projects and continues to work with CDFW and other state and federal permitting partners toward improved implementation of restoration permitting efficiencies to include the Habitat Restoration and Enhancement Act and Cutting the Green Tape. Table 2 below lists the biological permitting efficiencies that Caltrans and other restoration partners should implement to achieve the goal of improving the rate of recovery and conservation of species and their habitats across California.

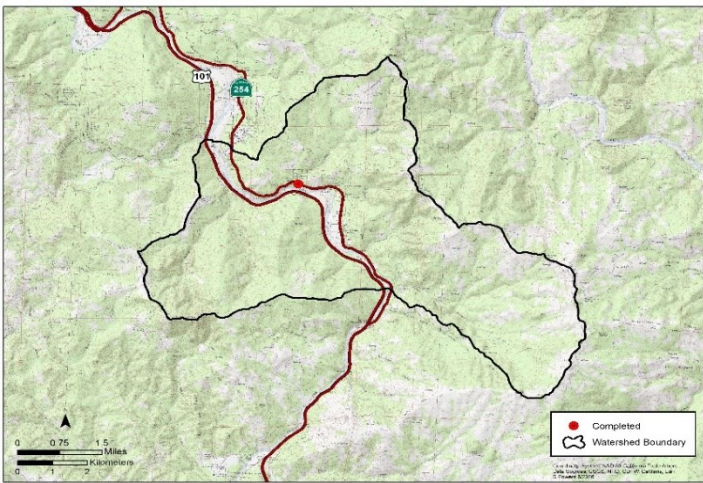

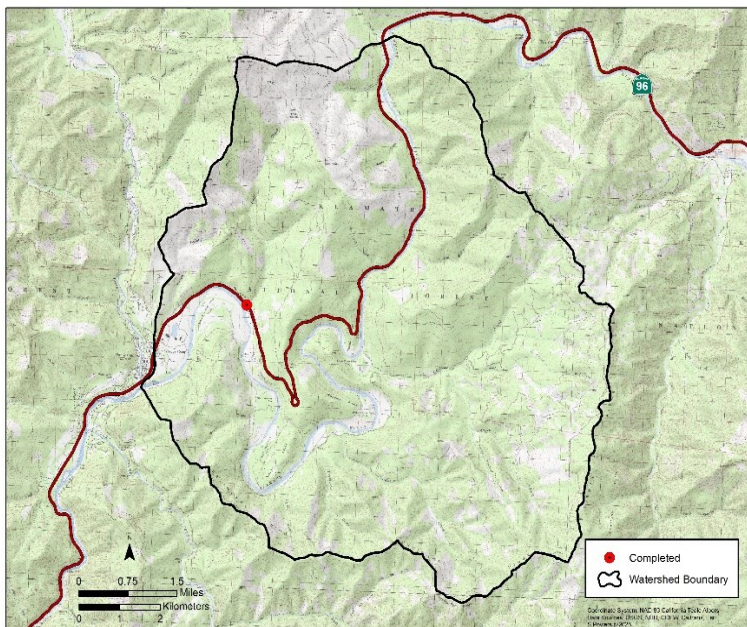

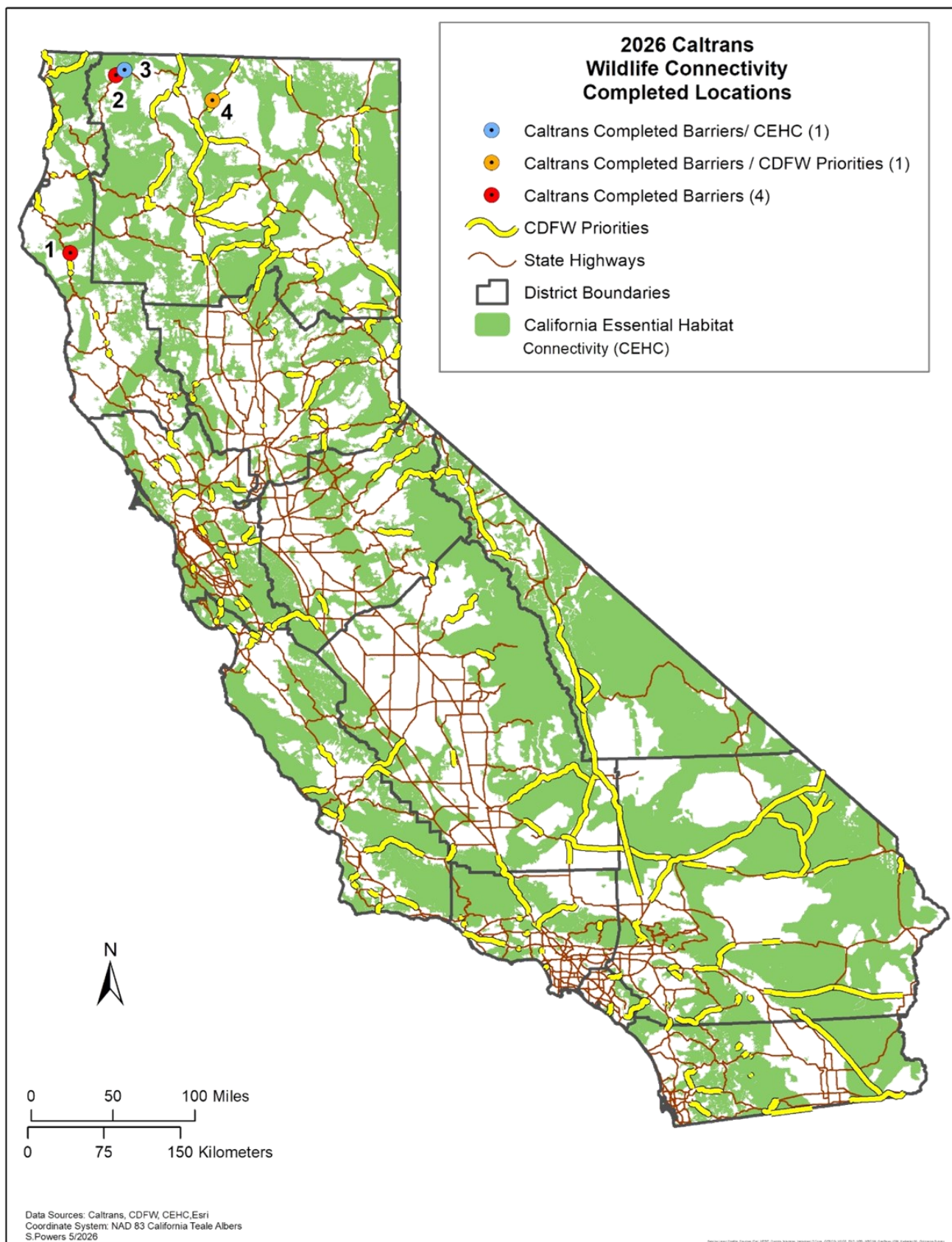


Figure 3. 2026 Completed Wildlife Connectivity Remediation Locations

2026 Active Wildlife Connectivity Remediation Locations

Caltrans is currently developing projects to remediate **39** active (funded) barriers to fish and wildlife on the SHS. Of the **39** active (funded) wildlife connectivity locations, **21** locations are within areas identified by the California Essential Habitat Connectivity (CEHC), **18** locations are within CDFW priority route segments, and **33** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDFW, CDPR, and others.

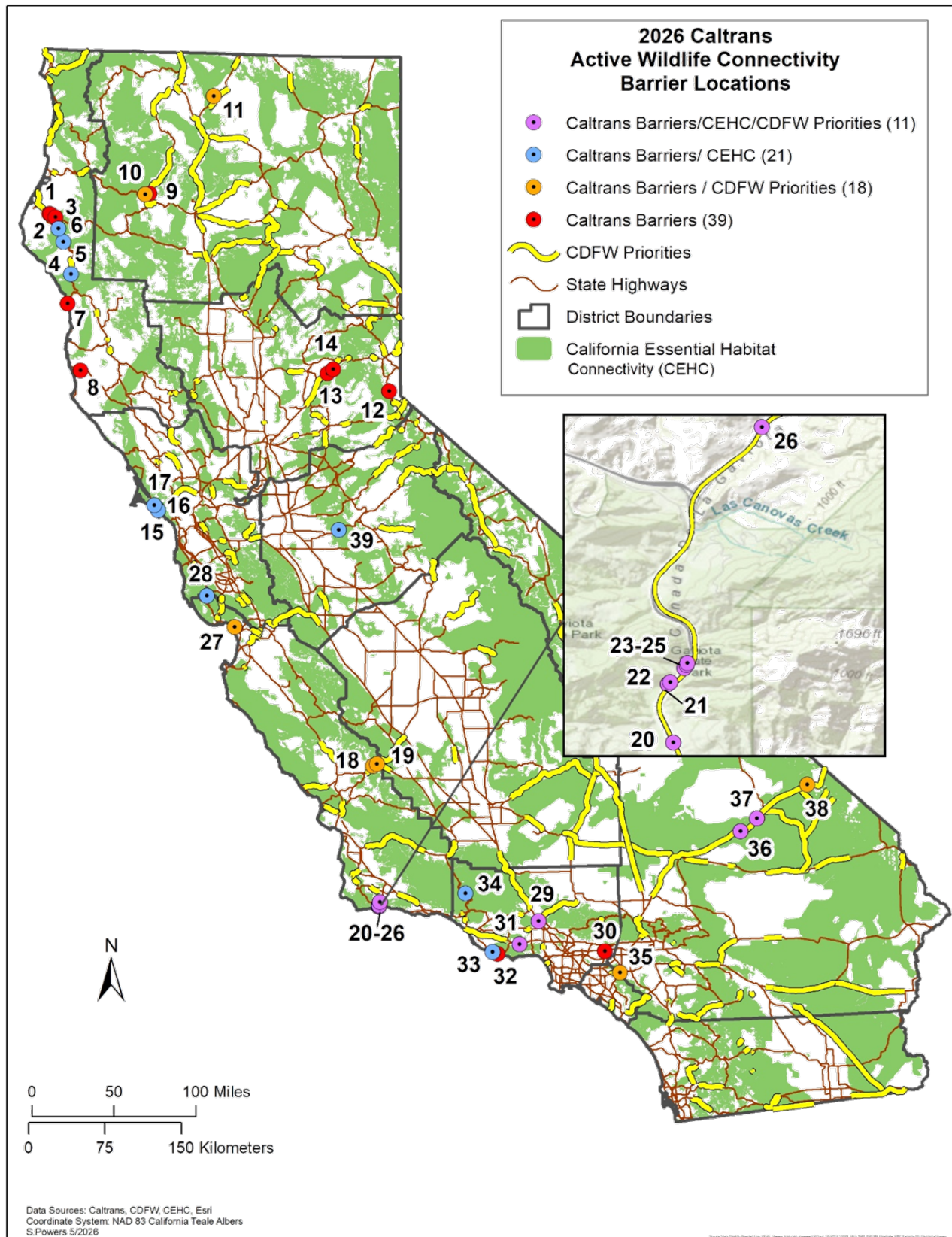


Figure 4. 2026 Active Wildlife Connectivity Remediation Locations

Table 4 below, lists the active (funded) fish and wildlife connectivity barrier remediation locations that are Caltrans led capital projects, and special funded (SF) projects are underlined. Special funded projects are led and funded by other project sponsors, with varying levels of Caltrans oversight and support. Figure 4 is a map of the locations listed in Table 4.

2026 Planned Funding – Wildlife Connectivity Locations

There are currently **31** planned funding fish and wildlife connectivity barrier locations in the early planning process, working toward completing Project Initiation Documents (PID), which serve to estimate the scope, schedule, and costs for site-specific fish and wildlife barrier remediation needs. Once wildlife connectivity remediation locations are identified for planned funding, it can take approximately two or three years to complete the planning phase and receive funding allocation approval from CTC. Planned funding locations listed in Table 5 below are in various stages of the planning process.

Of the **31** planned funding wildlife connectivity barrier locations, **20** are within areas identified by the California Essential Habitat Connectivity (CEHC), **19** locations are within CDFW priority route segments, and **31** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDPR, US NPS, or others.

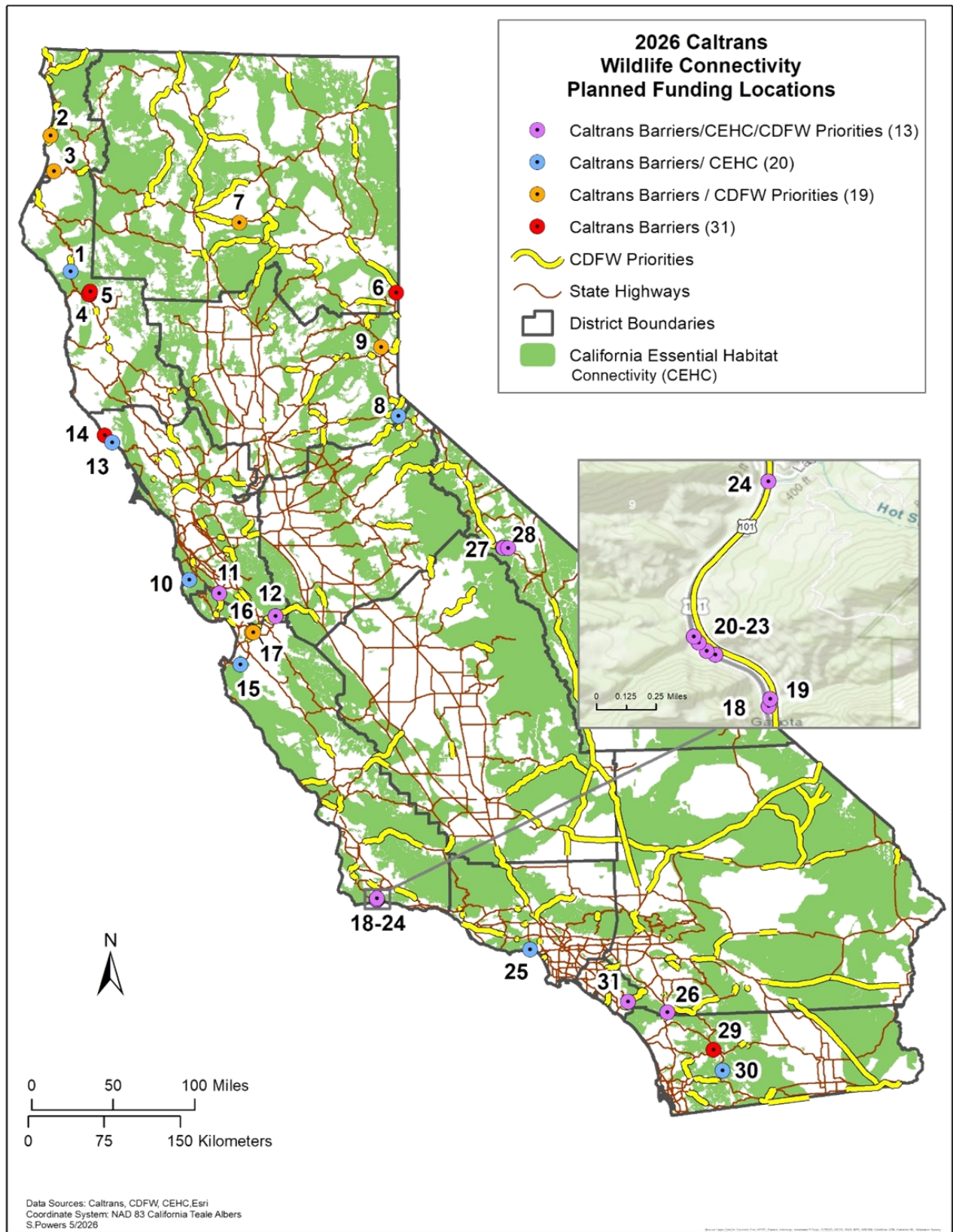


Figure 5. 2026 Planned Funding – Wildlife Connectivity Locations

Table 5 below, lists planned funding locations for fish and wildlife connectivity barrier remediation that are Caltrans led capital projects, and special funded (SF) projects are underlined. Special funded projects are led and funded by project sponsors, with varying levels of Caltrans oversight and support. Figure 5 is a map of the locations listed in Table 5.

2026 Priority Wildlife Connectivity Locations Requiring Funding

There are currently **93** priority wildlife connectivity barrier locations requiring funding, which have been identified by Caltrans districts and other state, federal, and local partners. Of the **93** Priority wildlife connectivity barrier locations that require funding, **52** are within areas identified by the California Essential Habitat Connectivity (CEHC), **74** locations (79% of all unfunded priorities) are within CDFW priority route segments, and **93** locations are within protected or semi-protected lands owned and managed by the USFS, CDPR, USNPS, and others.

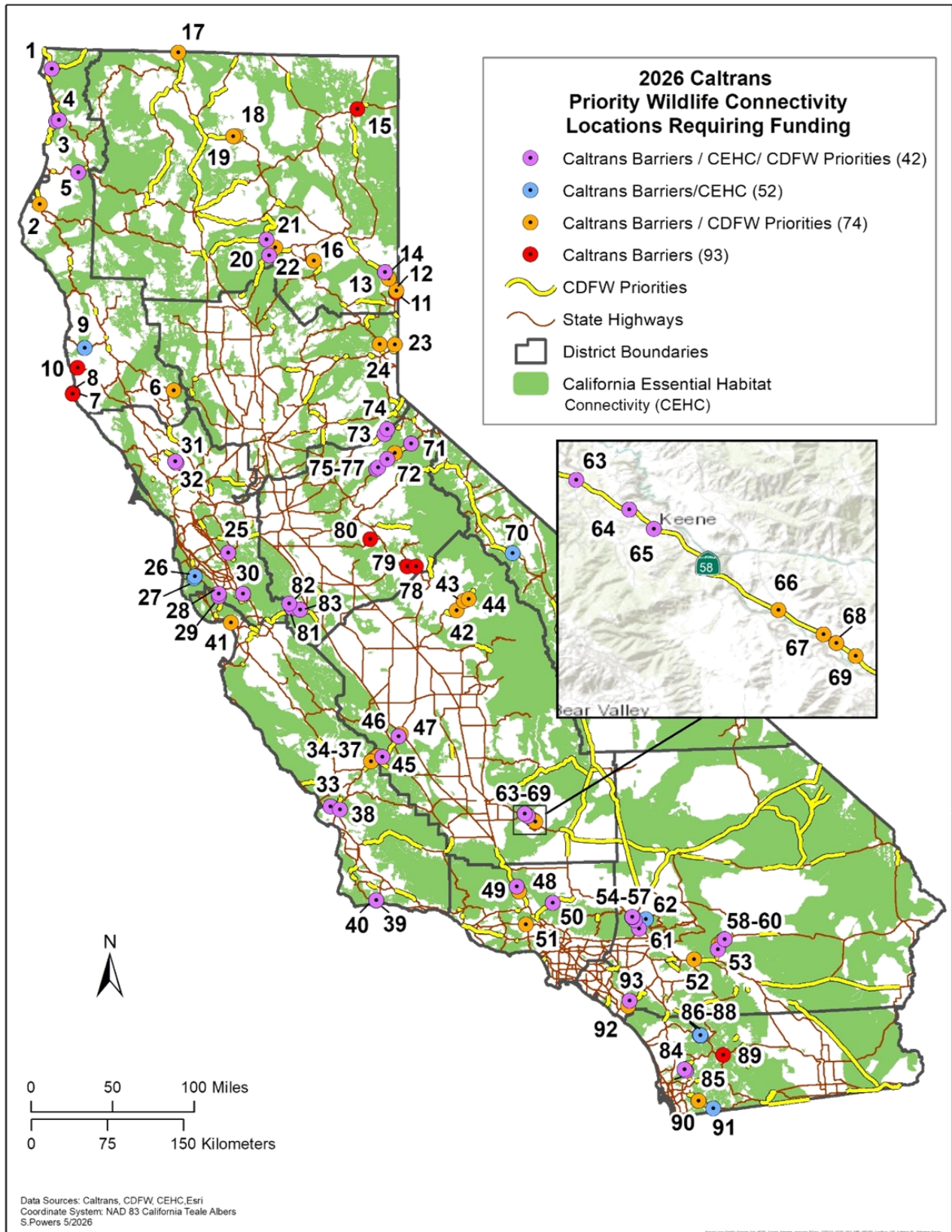


Figure 6. 2026 Priority Wildlife Connectivity Locations Requiring Funding

Table 6 below, lists **93** priority wildlife connectivity barrier remediation locations, including the threatened, endangered, fully protected, species of concern, and other species that will benefit. Figure 6 is a map of the locations listed in Table 6.
