¹³In May 2024, \$100,000,00 of Local federal-aid Safety apportionments and OA were transferred to OFR per Reference 2.5h and 2.5i from the March 21-22, 2024, California Transportation Commission meeting, in exchange for State Highway Account (SHA) funds. The transfer and exchange is allowed per Senate Bill (SB) 137 (Chapter 639 of the 2019 Statutes), effective October 8, 2019, which authorized the Department to allow up to \$100,000,000 of federal Local Assistance funds to be exchanged for SHA funds. The purpose of the exchange is to fund local Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) projects with State and local funds. The exchange will lead to increased efficiency for local agencies by reducing the time and resources needed to deliver HSIP projects.
