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INTRODUCTION

The Traffic Safety Navigator is the 2020–2024 California Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP) e-newsletter. The newsletter provides SHSP updates along with insight into best practices for implementing strategies that reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries on California's roadways. This edition is focused on the Challenge Area Leaders that are responsible for implementing SHSP actions and their accomplishments.

Over the course of the SHSP development and implementation processes, Challenge Area Leaders have gone above and beyond to organize and engage their team members, identify, develop and implement safety actions, update the tracking tool with action progress, and provide timely communication about the implementation of actions to the Steering Committee. The specific expertise and leadership provided to their Challenge Area Teams has been invaluable to the development and implementation of the SHSP. Challenge Area Leaders serve a vital role in leading and collaborating with a variety of interests representing federal, state, regional, local, tribal, and advocacy organizations. We are grateful to have support and input from a diverse pool of safety professionals and subject matter experts who share the goal of improving the safety of all public roads throughout California. Their knowledge of and commitment to proven as well as innovative approaches ensures the SHSP will strategically drive down fatalities and serious injuries on all of California's public roads.

HIGHLIGHTING CHALLENGE AREA LEADER ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2015–2019 SHSP Accomplishments

The number of partnerships that have enabled the SHSP to evolve over the last 14 years continue to grow. The 2015–2019 SHSP included 15 Challenge Areas, each tasked with specific actions to improve traffic safety. Due to the hard work and dedication of Challenge Area Leaders, 124 actions from the 2015–2019 SHSP were accomplished by December 31, 2019. These included the following types of actions:

- Surveys / Research
- Data Collection
- Pilot Programs
- Grant Funding

- Increased Equipment / Enforcement
- Guideline Updates
- Legislation
- Trainings

The completion of these actions is a result of collaboration amongst traffic safety stakeholders representing public agencies at the federal, state, regional, local and tribal levels as well as private companies and advocates. A total of 35 different stakeholder groups participated in the development of the 2015–2019 SHSP actions, serving as co-leads, action leads or key members to oversee the implementation of the 124 completed actions. This coordination helps to ensure that the 5 E Safety Strategies: Education, Enforcement, Engineering, Emergency Response and Emerging Technologies are addressed throughout action development and implementation. 2020–2024 SHSP Accomplishments

Action development has been underway for the 2020–2024 SHSP. During the fall, Challenge Area Teams refined the proposed actions to be responsive to the four new Guiding Principles introduced as part of the <u>Pivot</u>. There are currently 45 actions approved to begin implementation with more actively being developed by Challenge Area Teams. Early progress has been made on implementation and Challenge Area Leads have started sharing progress with the Steering Committee.

WHAT IS THE SHSP?

The California Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP) is a comprehensive, statewide transportation safety plan which provides a framework for reducing fatalities and serious injuries across all travel modes and on all public roads. Started in 2005, the SHSP is updated regularly to ensure continued progress and to meet changing safety needs. Currently, over 580 safety stakeholders from over 230 public and private agencies and organizations work together on this effort under the guidance of the SHSP Executive Leadership and SHSP Steering Committees. The SHSP addresses the 5 E Safety Strategies: Education, Enforcement, Engineering, Emergency Response and Emerging Technologies. In summer 2020, state transportation leaders recognized a bolder and more focused approach was necessary to combat the rise in fatalities and serious injuries that have occurred on California roadways since 2010. Four new Guiding Principles have been incorporated into the SHSP update process to further improve safety:

- **1. Integrate Equity**
- 2. Implement a Safe System Approach
- 3. Double Down on What Works
- 4. Accelerate Advanced Technology
